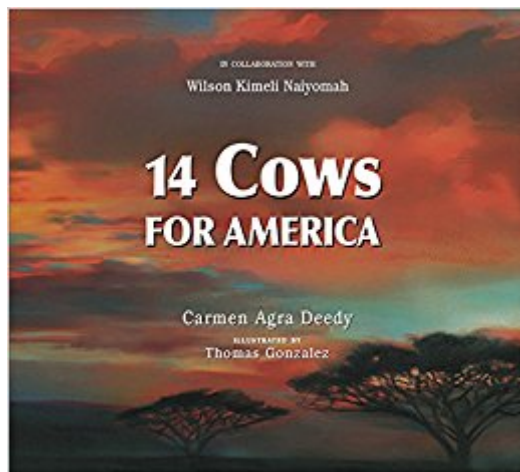

Synopsis

In June of 2002, a very unusual ceremony begins in a far-flung village in western Kenya. An American diplomat is surrounded by hundreds of Maasai people. A gift is about to be bestowed upon the American men, women, and children, and he is there to accept it. The gift is as unexpected as it is extraordinary. A mere nine months have passed since the September 11 attacks, and hearts are raw. Tears flow freely from American and Maasai as these legendary warriors offer their gift to a grieving people half a world away. Word of the gift will travel newswires around the globe. Many will be profoundly touched, but for Americans, this selfless gesture will have deeper meaning still. For a heartsick nation, the gift of fourteen cows emerges from the choking dust and darkness as a soft light of hope and friendship.

Starred Review. Grade 2-5 • Kimeli Naiyomah returned home to his Maasai village from New York City with news of 9/11 terrorist attacks. His story prompted the villagers to give a heartfelt gift to help America heal. Deedy and Gonzalez bring Naiyomah's story to life with pithy prose and vibrant illustrations. Each block of text consists of a few short, elegant sentences: "A child asks if he has brought any stories. Kimeli nods. He has brought with him one story. It has burned a hole in his heart." The suspenseful pace is especially striking when surrounded by Gonzalez's

exquisite colored pencil and pastel illustrations. The colors of Kenya explode off the page: rich blues, flaming oranges, fire-engine reds, and chocolate browns. Full-page spreads depict the Maasai people and their land so realistically as to be nearly lifelike. Gonzalez manages to break the fourth wall and draw readers in as real-time observers. The book's only flaw is the less-than-concrete ending: "There is no nation so powerful it cannot be wounded, nor a people so small they cannot offer mighty comfort" is an important message, but not a particularly satisfying one for children. Fortunately, their questions will be answered by Naiyomah's endnote, and it provides a fitting conclusion to this breathtaking chronicle.

This is the best book I've found yet for gently introducing 9/11 to elementary and preschool-aged children. Without the awful specifics (which can wait until the kids are old enough to truly understand), it details the story from the viewpoint of one who was there, and then adds the glorious story of how the Maasai people responded in kindness and generosity. We bought one for ourselves and one for our local elementary school, which the principal read to the students during morning announcements. It's a beautiful, extremely moving true story of the goodness in humanity. Gorgeous illustrations (especially the reflection of the Towers on fire reflected in a child's eye) complete the picture.

Book came within two days - it's for my wife who read this story awhile ago to some 3rd Graders who loved the story and now she loves it as well. Delivered promptly. A great buy and a great story.

I bought copies of this book from for my grandchildren and our church school to give them a new perspective on 9/11. But my husband enjoyed it as much as the rest of us. This book is heartbreaking and uplifting all at once. It teaches such a valuable lesson to children, that no kindness is ever too small. You will absolutely cry while reading it.
