

This book takes it slow and explains details of the language, like matching facial expressions to what you're signing. The activities in this book make ASL an easier concept to grasp. Activities that were helpful in this book were the practicing of common phrases and questions and probably one off the most entertaining games was called "Memory Madness" which was like playing the "Pyramid" game show while also perfecting our finger-spelling. Along with this book we also were required to purchase 'Introduction to the Deaf Community', I got the 5th edition, and it would be in understatement to say this book was helpful because this book saved my life, the alphabet on the back cover is an awesome touch for the moments that I get forgetful of a letter. The activities were good memory refreshers as well. Brenda E. Cartwright knows how to assure students will pass their courses with her great textbooks.
