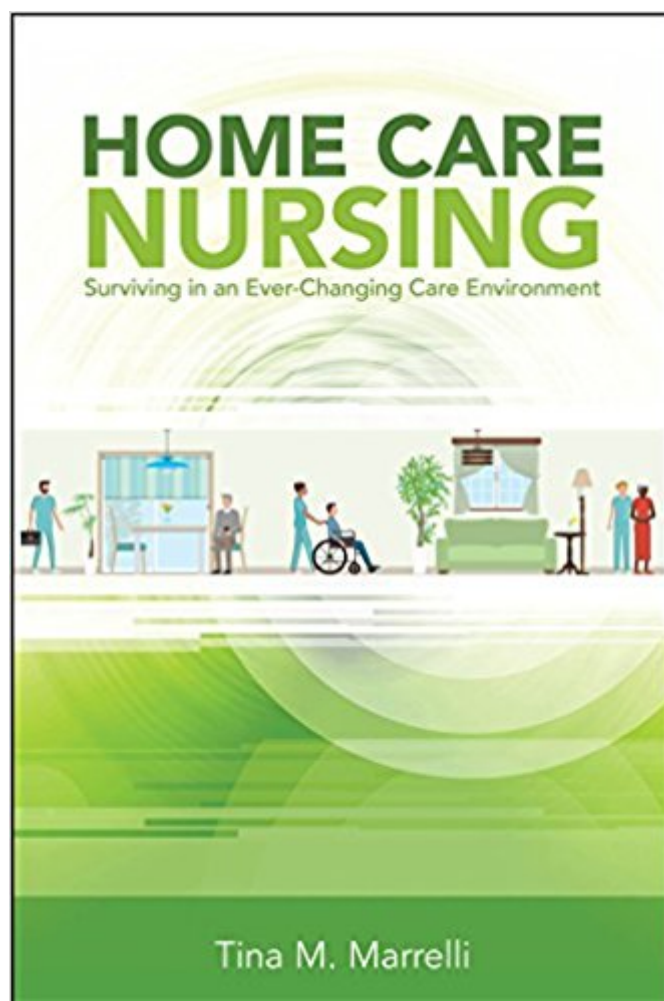


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# Home Care Nursing: Surviving In An Ever-changing Care Environment

This book is fantastic for the home care nurse or nurse manager. It covers everything from regulations that impact the home care nurse to the structure and documentation of a home care visit. Although it is packed with information, it is easy to read. Sometimes, as nurses, we are asked to do things without an explanation of why. This book explains the why. It discusses regulations, safety, the home environment, increased patient acuity, and how to be professional and efficient while providing high-quality goal-oriented care. I highly recommend this book for two audiences: for clinicians transitioning into home healthcare setting and for seasoned home care clinicians, managers and administrators. For new home health clinicians, you can find no better resource for your home health orientation.
