I ordered this book as it is required for my upcoming last semester of class for my ACNP program. My background in critical care includes almost six years of cardiac, cardiovascular, and medical-surgical intensive care work.I started reading the book about 24 hours ago and have finished three of the 16 chapters. My initial impressions were that the book is very conveniently-sized for carrying and reading, and reads easily. It is written primarily in a narrative tone; I don't feel like I'm reading a medical text.Unfortunately, the compliments end there. As I have continued reading, I am consistently distracted by poor editing: awkward grammar, missed punctuation, misspellings, and subject-verb disagreements. I would estimate there are at least two errors of this type per each opening. As an example, on the last page that I read (after determining I would write this review), the following appears on page 136: "The change in temperature registered at the distal thermometer 'is then calculates' (sic) the area under the curve as the cardiac output and it is similar to dye-dilution method." This is just one of the many grammatical errors I have found. For having spent \$60 on a book that claims to be a medical reference for ACNPs, I am very disappointed in the abundance of errors I've found on a cursory reading.Additionally, as I mentioned before, the book reads very easily and doesn't sound like a medical reference. I found this satisfying at first as I am turning a lot of pages; unfortunately after three chapters (legal, pulmonary, and cardiac), I don't feel I've learned anything I didn't already know. I can attribute this primarily to my background in critical care. It may be useful for ACNP students whose critical care background is limited (or whose programs require buying the textbooks), but I would not recommend it for experienced ICU nurses or certified ACNPs.
