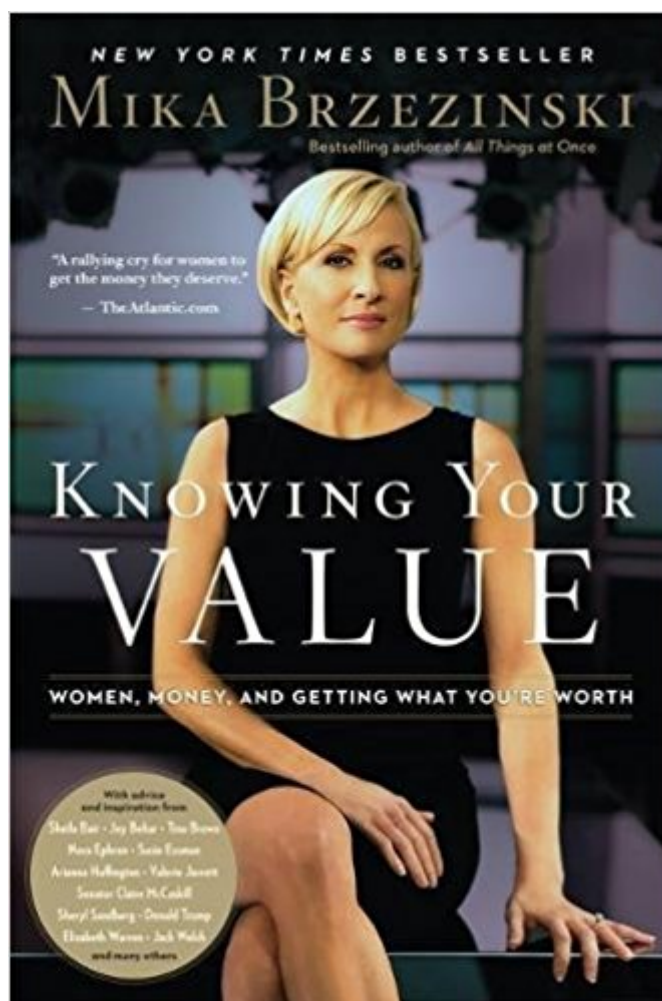

Perhaps if I knew who Mika was, or watched more television, I would find this book more beneficial. I have never seen her show, and maybe am missing the connection between this book and her persona. But without that connection, this book is merely OK. And wow! talk about making the same point over and over - I think it would be possible summarize the entire book in about 5 bullet points. . After introducing the main themes, the rest is name-dropping and a discussion of conversations that circle back to the same points - it also worries me that somehow conversations with "famous" people are construed as truth or fact, and that there is very little research to support many of the "insights". For example, because Mika works in the "journalism" field, are here experiences universally applicable to all businesses and situations? I expected a bit more substance. Still, the few points that are made in this book are good ones, and there is some merit in using her experience as abject lessons in how to reflect on one's actions and career.

There are only a few "how to" paragraphs, as most of the book discusses what we are doing incorrectly, and the impact that it creates. Brzezinsky has an interesting personal story that is presented in snippets throughout the book, and her narrative is supplemented by interviews of successful executives in a way that is very much engaging. I'm sure that the book will resonate with most women, since I encountered several descriptions that felt familiar. This book is fast read and worth the time. I also bought a copy for my best friend.

Read this while I was job hunting. I did something I had never done before when offered a job. I negotiated and it worked! They came back with a counter offer. Now, I'm still underpaid (of course, ha!), but this book made a difference in my life and I highly recommend it!

The book does bring up a lot of experiences and issues that I have encountered but not realized it as a problem that I should focus on and solve.
