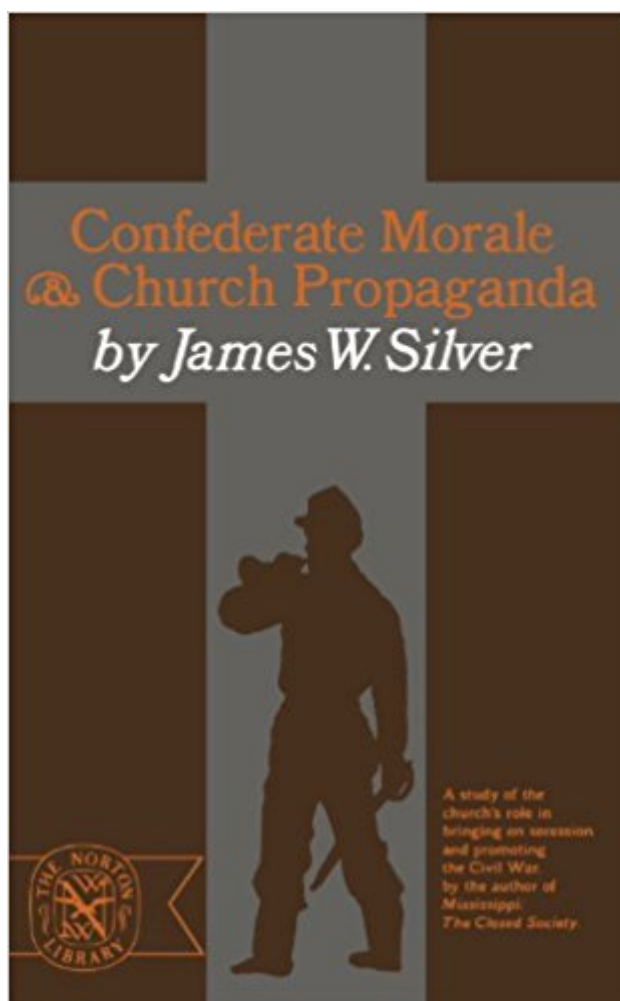


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Confederate Morale And Church Propaganda



Synopsis

A study of the church's role in bringing on secession and promoting the Civil War, by the author of *Mississippi: The Closed Society*. In this closely documented study, Professor James W. Silver examines the role of the church in the South during the Civil War: what part it played as a powerful social institution in shaping the mind of the South, bringing on secession, and promoting the war, and to what extent its efforts succeeded or failed.

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James W. Silver does an excellent job of covering confederate morale and the surrounding influences upon it. Silver depicts in intricate detail how the South was turned against the North during the Civil War. The book also makes a compelling case that the church was the leading factor in shaping Southerners' views. This is the only book that provides an interesting look into Confederate propaganda.

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
