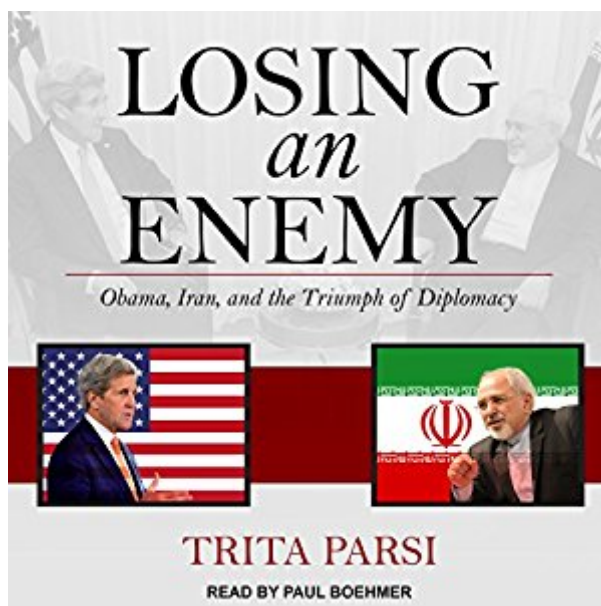


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Losing An Enemy: Obama, Iran, And The Triumph Of Diplomacy

Comprehensive review of the tortured process leading to this important agreement

This book is nothing more than the repeat of a pack of the most boldfaced lies. Written by Trita Parsi, one of the most notorious agents of the Khomeinist regime in DC, it is the promotion of not only an implausible scheme but a recounting of the complete betrayal of both the Iranian AND American people, as well as the international public who would believe anything that anyone

In a similar vein, any military operation against Iran will likely be very unpopular around the world and require the proper international context--both to ensure the logistical support the operation would require and to minimize the blowback from it. The best way to minimize international opprobrium and maximize support (however, grudging or covert) is to strike only when there is a widespread conviction that the Iranians were given but then rejected a superb offer--one so good that only a regime determined to acquire nuclear weapons and acquire them for the wrong reasons would turn it down. Under those circumstances, the United States (or Israel) could portray its operations as taken in sorrow, not anger, and at least some in the international community would conclude that the Iranians 'brought it on themselves'" --"Which Path to Persia," p. 39 Also outlined in "Which Path to Persia" are a desire for an Iran sponsored 9/11 of some kind and the need for creating Iranian provocations that can be used as excuses for war. To not have discussed "Which Path to Persia," the author is at best ignorant, or at worse a misinformation agent for those behind the machinations contained therein.

The rehashing of the old pro-Islamist regime narrative being pushed by an author who has been directly tied to the Islamist regime, acting as its de facto agent in the U.S. Yes, President Obama was great on many fronts, but his foreign policy, especially on Iran has been discredited across the board.
