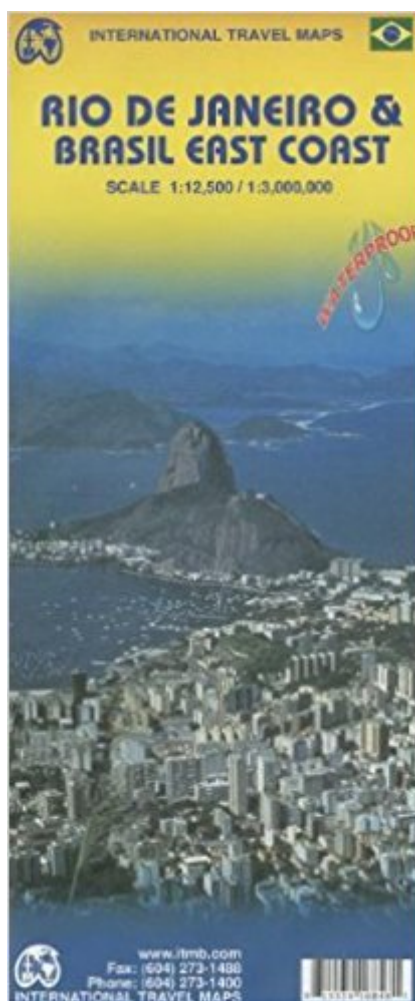

Rio is the site of the Summer Olympic Games in 2016. As such, it is bound to become even better-known and more visited as the Games approach. The city itself, with its Sugar Loaf Mountain, its carnival atmosphere, and its marvelous beaches, is already the most visited city in South America. This new edition not only updates and adds more information about Rio, and details the Olympic sites, but includes for the first time a major improvement for visitors. Anyone coming to Rio probably also wants to see the surrounding countryside, but not necessarily all of Brasil, so we have created a detailed map of the coastal area of Brasil, from Porto Alegre in the south to Fortaleza in the north, and extending inland to include Sao Paulo, Brasilia, and Belo Horizonte. I was traveling alone to Rio De Janiero for about 10 days, and I needed a map in order to navigate

the city. There weren't many reviews for maps, so I ended up purchasing this map, the DestinationMap by National Geographic, and the GlobeTrotter travel map, figuring I'd get all three, and work it out once I got there. IMHO, this map was the best of the three. For what it's worth, all the maps I got were waterproof, and it turned out to be a big deal, b/c it was raining the entire time I was there. I really needed a no-frills map, without tourist factoids / filler on it. This was the only map out of the three that fit the bill - no huge legends which take up half the space, no history of Christ the Redeemer, Sugar Loaf, Tijuca forest or Botanical Gardens, just the map. When folded up, one side is the cover in the picture, but the other side is the Brazilian metro subway map. When I was trying to navigate the metro system (definitely the easiest way to get around), I didn't have to unfold a map 5x in order to figure out where I was going. Muito bom! Facile Facile! Additionally, what I liked was that this map was huge, but clearly detailed, one side being Rio de Janeiro, and the other side being the east coast of Brazil. It folded up small, but once unfolded, I could really see the city clearly, and it was easy to figure out how to navigate around. I did get lost a few times, but whenever I found a sign, I was able to open the map and get my bearings b/c it outlined Rio de Janeiro down to the smallest streets and corridors. This map definitely saved me on multiple occasions from wandering into the wrong part of town. I would recommend that any person traveling from the US to Rio de Janeiro for the first time, bring: (1) this map, and (2) this dictionary: *Larousse Mini Dictionary : Portuguese-English / English-Portuguese* I found both extremely helpful during my time there.

We are visiting Rio this summer. This map really map clear the layout of this coastal city. Helped me know where to stay. I am sure it will be well-used during our stay in Rio.

The map is a paper map, not laminated, and it didn't have the area that I am staying in. Very central Rio focused.

I don't know why I thought this map was waterproof. It's not but that's ok.

I haven't actually used it yet, except for planning, but it seems to be up to ITMB's usual high standards.

The map seems very detailed with no extraneous tourist information to clutter it up. We won't be putting it to use for several months so I won't know until then if it is accurate.

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
